Application Due Date: March 31, 2017

The Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Office of Planning, Research, and Evaluation (OPRE) anticipates soliciting applications for Behavioral Interventions Scholars grants to support dissertation research by advanced graduate students who are using behavioral science approaches to examine specific research questions of relevance to social service programs and policies. These grants are meant to build capacity in the research field to apply a behavioral lens to issues facing poor and vulnerable families in the United States, and to foster mentoring relationships between faculty members and high-quality doctoral students. Applicants will be required to demonstrate the applicability of their research to practice or policy serving low-income children, adults, and families, especially those that seek to improve their well-being. Specific topics of interest may be delineated in the full funding opportunity announcement.

Internship Opportunities

 APA-Accredited School Psychology Internships in New Orleans 2017-2018

The application receipt deadline this year for the Louisiana School Psychology Internship Consortium (LAS*PIC) is November 15. LAS*PIC serves the metropolitan area of New Orleans collaboratively matching interns with partner traditional and charter schools.

LAS*PIC operates in a mixture of school settings (urban, suburban, and rural) populated with a diverse student enrollment staffed with teachers both traditionally trained as well as alternative certification. The city of New Orleans is transitioning in 2017-18 from a collection of independent charter school districts into one school system that existed before the failure of the federal levees in 2005. Surrounding school systems are planning to address new requirements of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) in a state with one of the most promising rates of improvement. School psychologists are in short supply, so districts are eager to receive an intern.

LAS*PIC operates a highly challenging internship curriculum coupled with licensed, doctoral supervision. We are hosting ten interns this year (about a typical number for us). For the 2017-18 year, to maintain quality of the experience amid increasing demands on limited resources, we will reduce to number of available internship slots to eight, despite a local demand for almost twice that amount. While we realize this will increase competition for the limited slots, we believe we can best maintain the designed challenges of the internship program by lowering our expected number of positions.
